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President's Report

2020 will forever be remembered for the Covid-19 pandemic. Our lives were disrupted, many lives were lost, many more fell seriously ill. There was no escaping the fact that the activities of Netball ACT and netball in the ACT would be disrupted by the pandemic and the measures put in place by governments to keep us all safe. Therefore, 2020 was a different year for netball; yet in the end, despite all the disruption and with a lot of effort from a lot of people, netball was played, successfully, in the ACT in 2020; albeit with Covid Safety Plans in place. To all those involved in ensuring that our game was played and played safely, I say thank you. Sport, and for us, netball in particular, is such a part of the fabric of our lives that to have been able to run our competitions in such a time of upheaval is both comforting and a major achievement.

Sadly, however, the National Netball Championships (17 & Under and 19 & Under) which were due to be held in April 2020 were cancelled because of the pandemic and later in the year the Australian National League competition was also cancelled. On a brighter note, NACT was able to hold selection trials for the ACT 17 & Under and 19 & Under squads for the 2021 competition in late 2020. For the first time in many years the Association participated in the NSW Premier League (through the Capital Spirit) in both the Opens and U23 competition. Aside from the normal training commitments, participating in this competition requires a significant travel commitment by both athletes and coaching staff and while a tough year on court, the experience of playing in this competition has been of significant benefit to our athletes.

The pandemic was not the only issue affecting NACT in 2020. A major capability and governance review was commenced in late 2020 with the outcomes being presented to the NACT Board in January 2021. The implementation of the review recommendations will be a major focus for NACT and the Districts during 2021.

In August NACT farewelled CEO David Marjoribanks and welcomed Nikki Horton (also General Manager of the NSW Swifts) as interim CEO while a new CEO was recruited. As a result of that recruitment process, NACT welcomed, in late November, Matthew Battams as CEO – Matthew having previously worked at Netball Queensland and prior to that at Suncorp.

I am pleased to report that notwithstanding the disruption of the pandemic NACT is in a sound financial position as is reported in the attached financial statements. However, there are some challenges ahead; implementing the capability and governance review recommendations, the ongoing risk of the pandemic, the need to ensure the growth of our sport and ensuring appropriate facilities to cater for this level of participation, to mention just a few. I am confident that the Association, in conjunction with the Districts, will successfully meet these challenges. During the year the Association was able to secure a commitment from the ACT Government to invest \$7.5 million in our netball facilities across the Territory. This is a significant investment by the Government and we are very grateful for the confidence that the Government has shown in netball. While the details of the expenditure and the timing of the funds being made available to netball are still being negotiated, it will provide a significant boost to our sport. The Government is to be congratulated for its commitment to netball.

There are many people who commit to netball on a weekly basis – all of whom contribute in their own way to the successful organisation of netball in the ACT. They are the coaches, the umpires, the scorers, the timers, the District committee members, those who run the canteens and bbqs, those who do the draws, the supporters at Saturday netball, State League and Junior Championships and of course the athletes who play our wonderful game. We need all of you for our game to prosper and I thank you for your commitment to netball.

I would also like to thank the staff of NACT who, despite the uncertainties caused by the pandemic, continued to provide support to the netball community and who worked hard to ensure that NACT's social competitions and State League could be played in a safe environment.

District Presidents' give an enormous amount of their time to netball – not only to matters affecting their district, but also to matters affecting netball in the ACT. Their commitment to netball – participation, growth and prosperity – is significant and integral to the success of netball in the ACT.

For the Directors of NACT, 2020 was a challenging year in so many ways. I would like to thank all of them for their support of the Association and their commitment to the success of netball in the ACT.

As we move into 2021 there are challenges ahead but the Association is well placed to meet these challenges and its Directors and staff look forward to working with you all, for the betterment of netball in the ACT.

SolarHub Home Grown Hero Award - Belinda Daunt

Belinda founded the St Benedict's Primary School Netball Club in 2018. The club started as two teams and in 2020 had five teams across the Junior Divisions and Net Set Go. The club also fielded teams in SCNA's twilight competition. Belinda organised team uniforms, fundraised, facilitated holiday training, organised team celebrations as well as coaching, managing and umpiring for the club. In 2020, Belinda further increased her commitment at SCNA by coaching a SCNA representative team. Belinda is passionate about netball, fosters good sportsmanship and most importantly ensures that all children have fun and enjoy the game.

Social Media Award – Good Shephard Netball Club

Good Shephard Netball Club identified a need to do things differently when netball returned from the COVID shutdown in 2020. The Club developed a video educating members about the importance of meeting the COVID requirements for the modified 2020 season. This video was instrumental in assisting members to understand how community netball could resume safely and received over one thousand views.



Inclusive Community Award – Gungahlin Jets Australian Football and Netball Club

The Gungahlin Jets Australian Football and Netball Club developed an inclusion program that provided opportunities for players with a disability to enjoy the benefits of netball. A significant focus was providing players with the opportunity to compete in the North Canberra Netball Competition and this was achieved with the team competing in Division 6 of the competition. Traditional measures of success were not the focus of this team and the joy and sense of belonging that the team achieved were truly evident. The team have subsequently entered a team in the Belconnen Summer Competition and intend to compete again in the 2021 North Canberra Netball Competition.

Netball ACT Umpire of the Year - Trent Rawlings

Trent continued his enthusiasm for umpiring in the ACT during 2020. Not only did Trent continue to be a leading umpire for the HCF State League, he assisted other umpires at Junior Championships and attended State League District training sessions to discuss rule interpretations or to umpire match-play. Trent is involved in post-game discussions with other State League umpires and panel members and is more than happy to assist by umpiring a second game or coaching umpires. Trent reviews footage of his own umpiring and works with other umpires to continue to improve his own performance.



Coaching Excellence Award – Tara Steel

Tara is the Head Coach of Canberra Netball Association and has had a positive impact on almost every player at the District. During the COVID isolation period, Tara created and implemented a satellite training program using social media and Team App to allow all junior and senior representative players to continue their training remotely and to stay connected. The program included skills sessions, resilience, goal setting, returning from injury and strength and conditioning. Tara's focus on supporting the wellbeing of all athletes and improving them as a netballer and as a person has benefitted Canberra Netball Association's entire membership base.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

ACT Netball Association Incorporated (the association) has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (1991).

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Comparative Figures

Where required, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the incorporated association and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Affiliation

Affiliation revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Game fees and registration

Game fees and registration is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the incorporated association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

As the incorporated association is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other shortterm, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Inventories

Goods are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value on a 'first in first out' basis. Costs of purchased inventory are determined after deducting rebates and discounts received or receivable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost or fair value less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Indoor Centre	40 years
Furniture, fittings and equipment	3 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

NOTE 2: CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The depreciation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The incorporated association assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the incorporated association and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.
